THE 10,000 BOOK PYRAMID!

Did you know that children whose parents read to them daily hear more than a million words more than kids whose parents have never read to them? We are again embarking on a yearlong reading challenge to help students and staff

commit to reading every night.

So far this school year, we have read over 4,000 books with our 10,000 Book Pyramid. In October, when we reached 2,000 books, we participated in schoolwide scarecrow making that were displayed at the Halloween Parade. After reaching 4,000 books, the students were treated to a week of guest readers and holiday ornament-making. I am sure students are excited to see what the 6,000 book goal brings their way!

To keep up our success with the 10,000 book pyramid, I have some suggestions to help keep reading at home. Reading together can be a fun and exciting time for you and your child.

FROM THE GUIDANCE OFFICE

Happy Winter! It's hard to believe we are already just about half way through the school year. The snow is falling, the holidays went by in a blur, and we are getting ready for Regents exams and second report cards!

ELEMENTARY NEWS:

We are thrilled to have our Primary Project (PP) Program up and running with 15 students in the Fall Session. The Cub Cave, Room #118 houses both our Primary Project Playroom as well as our Sensory Room. These spaces are great new additions to the Elementary building to help support the success of our FCS students.

If you haven't heard about Primary Project yet, it's a school-based intervention designed to enhance school related competencies and reduce mild to moderate social, emotional and/or school engagement difficulties in children PreK through 3rd grade. Students appropriate for the program may demonstrate one or more of the following, low engagement in the classroom and/or with peers, shyness, separation anxiety, disinterest in attending school, poor attendance and concerns with managing behavior.

Participants are selected based on several methods of information gathering, including classroom observation and questionnaire done by the teacher, attendance records, parent referral, input and consent from parents, School Counselor observation as well as any other data available through our Student Support Team. Selected students are scheduled for weekly sessions with our PP trained Child Associate for 12-15 weeks. They participate in child-led play activities geared toward decision making and problem solving, as well as building confidence and positive associations with the school environment/school personnel. After just 6 weeks, we are seeing encouraging changes and hearing positive feedback from several parents and teachers.

We are so proud of all of our Character Trait Award Recipients for demonstrating each of the traits we have focused on so far this school year: Self-Control, Gratitude, Kindness and Respect. Each month, students have the opportunity to be selected by showcasing the character trait of the month. Award winners get their picture on the wall in the hallway, a certificate and a special pancake breakfast with the Principal and other special guests.

The 5th grade Kindness Crew has been spreading kindness throughout the Elementary School Building. Students have made inspiring posters/collages, posted inspiring notes on lockers and written thank you notes to school staff and teachers that have made an impact on their lives. Grabbing a device and a reading app doesn't replace reading with you from a book with pages. Reduce screen time by putting a bin of books in the backseat of the car or in the playroom.
