NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a **public hearing** of the qualified voters of the Franklinville Central School District, Cattaraugus County, Franklinville, New York, will be held in the Auditorium at Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School building in said District on **Tuesday, May 10, 2022, at 5:30 PM** prevailing time, for the presentation of the budget. The budget will be available for review on May 3, 2022, at the District Clerk's Office in the Junior-Senior High School.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the annual meeting of the qualified voters of the Franklinville Central School District of the Town of Franklinville, Cattaraugus County, New York, will be held at the Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School in said District on **Tuesday, May 17, 2022, at 12:00 PM** prevailing time, at which said vote and election will be held for eight consecutive hours between the hours of 12:00 PM and 8:00 PM, prevailing time, in the Gymnasium Foyer at Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School. At that time, the polls will be opened to vote by voting by ballot or machine upon the following items:

To adopt the School District's annual budget for the fiscal year 2022-2023 and to authorize at an appropriate amount, the requisite portion thereof to be raised by taxation on the District's taxable property.

To elect (1) member of the Board for a five-year term commencing July 1, 2022, expiring on June 30, 2027, and to succeed Suzzane Ciesla, whose term expires on June 30, 2022.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HERE-BY GIVEN that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required to fund the School District's budget for 2022-2023, exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any resident of the District during business hours beginning 14 days before the vote, except Saturday, Sunday or holidays Tuesday, May 3, 2022, at the Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HERE-BY GIVEN that petitions nominating candidates for the office of the member of the Board of Education shall be filed with the Clerk of said School District at her office in the Junior-Senior High School, not later than Monday, April 18, 2022, between 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM. Each petition shall be directed to the Clerk of the District and shall be signed by at least (25) voters of the District, must

state the name and residence of the candidate, and shall describe the specific vacancy for which the candidate is nominated.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HERE-BY GIVEN that applications for absentee ballots will be obtainable between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM Monday through Friday, except holidays, from the District Clerk. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the election if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter or the day before the election if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. *The District Clerk must receive absentee ballots no later than 5:00 PM, prevailing time, on Tuesday, May 17, 2022.*

A list of persons to whom absentee ballots are issued will be available for inspection to qualified voters of the District in the office of the District Clerk on and after May 11, 2022, between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM on weekdays before the day set for the annual election and on May 17, 2022, the day set for the election, and said list will be posted at the polling place(s) at the election. Any qualified voter present in the polling place may object to the voting of the ballot upon appropriate grounds for making their challenge, and the reasons are therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HERE-BY GIVEN that military voters who are not currently registered may apply to register as a qualified voter of the school district. Military voters who are qualified school district voters may apply for a military ballot. Military voters may choose to receive a military voter registration, military ballot application, military ballot by mail, facsimile transmission, or electronic mail in their request for registration, ballot application, or ballot. Military voter registration application forms must be received in the Office of the District Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 22, 2022. Military ballot applications must be received in the Office of the District Clerk by mail or in person by also no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 22, 2022. No military ballot will be canvassed unless it is returned by mail or in-person and (1) received in the Office of the District Clerk before the close of the polls on election day and showing a cancellation mark of the United States postal service or a foreign country's postal service, or showing a dated endorsement of receipt by another

agency of the United States government; or (2) received by the Office of the District Clerk by no later than 5:00 p.m. on election day and signed and dated by the military voter and one witness, with a date which is associated be not later than the day before the election;


AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HERE-**BY GIVEN** that the qualified voters of the School District are entitled to vote at said annual vote and election. A qualified voter is (1) a citizen of the United States of America, (2) eighteen years of age or older, and (3) a resident within the School District for thirty (30) days preceding the annual vote and election. The School district may require all persons offering to vote at the budget vote and election to provide one form of proof of residency under Education Law §2018-c. Such form may include a driver's license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill, or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the School District may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name, and address. Any person who would not be qualified to register or vote under the provisions of Election Law Sections 5-100 and 5-106 will not have the right to register for or vote in an election.


AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HERE-BY GIVEN, that pursuant to a rule adopted under Education by §2035 and 2008 of the Education Law, any referenda or propositions to amend the budget, otherwise to be submitted for voting at said election, must be filed with the Franklinville Central School District Board of Education at the Regular Meeting on or before April 19, 2022, at 5:00 PM prevailing time; must be typed or printed in English, must be directed to the Clerk of the School District and signed by at least (43) qualified voters of the District (representing 5% of the number of voters who voted in the previous annual election); and must state the name and residence of each signer. However, the School board will not entertain any petition to place before the voters any proposition the purpose of which is not within the powers of the voters to determine, or any proposition which fails to include a specific appropriation where the proposition requires the expenditure of monies.

Ms. Rhoades has met with all the 8th graders for several college and career readiness activities and has prepared them for their 1:1 scheduling with Mr. Harris. Mr. Harris will be meeting with all the 8th graders individually to conduct their four-year plan as they transition to the High School. He will have more information on the 8th grade orientation to the High School.

Attention all current 5th graders! Mrs. Layton has met with each 5th grade student to find out if they plan to participate in Band and/or Chorus next year. She has been working with Ms. Rhoades on transition planning to help ease their way into the Junior/Senior High School. Remember that all students have TEN DAYS into the new school year to change their schedule. After the first 10 days of classes each year, we do not permit schedule changes. Currently in the works is a visitation day on June 17th, where the 5th graders will get a tour of the school, meet some teachers and even have lunch in the Jr/Sr HS cafeteria. We are also working with our current 6th graders to plan a short visit to the 5th graders to share some helpful information with them towards the end of the year. In addition, with the lifting of a lot of the covid restrictions that have prevented many of our events the last two years, we are pleased to say we will once again have an in-person family orientation for the upcoming 6th graders towards the end of summer so look for information on that soon. All these activities are geared to streamline the transition from Elementary to Jr/Sr High School.

The 8th graders all attended a College and Career Readiness trip to the Ellicottville BOCES Center on March 15th and had a great time learning about different careers. On May 3rd they will travel to Houghton College to learn about college life, see the campus, and get them starting to think about college after High School. They will also learn all the things they can do in High School to prepare. Permission slips for this trip went home in March and must be turned in no later than April 26th.

Ms. Rhoades is still working on getting the 6th and 7th graders over to the ROPES course at the Ellicottville BOCES center to work on team building, communication skills, and other skills they have been working on in their Advisement class. Permission slips for these trips will be coming home soon so look out for them. Ms. Rhoades continues to work on the importance of attendance and once again at the completion of the third quarter she entered all the students grades 6-8 with perfect school attendance (includ-



ing remote learners that were quarantined) into a drawing for a prize. We had 17 eligible students for quarter 3! The winner of the electronic thesaurus was Addisyn Killingbeck. Addisyn is a 7th grader at TBA. Congratulations Addisyn!

The Catt. County Youth Court is willing to provide more trainings at our school for students interested in participating. Just see Ms. Rhoades on how to sign up for the next training.

Boys & Girls grades 6 and up: Do you enjoy camping, being outdoors, doing community service, and other amazing activities? Think about joining Boy Scout Troop 601. 


