FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT...

I wanted to share with you a serious concern regarding the increase of e-cigs, vaping, JUULS, or other electronic nicotine delivery systems. Schools across the state are battling an increase in use, in and out of school with teenage kids. The products, although varied, are generally a liquid containing nicotine and usually accompanied by some type of flavor. The product is heated which produces a vapor to be inhaled. Many smokers are using vaping to “kick” the habit of cigarette smoking, however the amount of nicotine that a single cartridge of liquid can equal or exceed that of a pack of cigarettes. The New York State Education Department along with all schools across the state have been attempting to combat the increase use of these products in school and also provide information to students regarding the risk of use. In a recent correspondence from the State Education Commission, Commissioner Elia is asking Districts to do the following:

- We are asking schools to raise awareness and educate youth on the dangers of e-cigarettes.
- E-cigarettes are battery powered devices that heat a solution of liquid nicotine, flavorings, and other chemicals creating an aerosol that is inhaled by the user: [NYSDOH E-cigarette infographic](#).
- In fact, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has declared youth e-cigarette use an epidemic: [FDA Press Release](#).
- According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nicotine is addictive and has lasting consequences for youth brain development including impaired cognitive functioning and the development of addiction pathways in the brain.

Franklinville Central School District is looking to partner with families of our community along with the State Education Department to combat this emerging epidemic. I would ask that you remain vigilant and continue to look for the signs and product labels your child may have. As a District we will be taking proactive steps to install vape detectors throughout our buildings in an attempt to limit students' access and use of these products on school grounds.

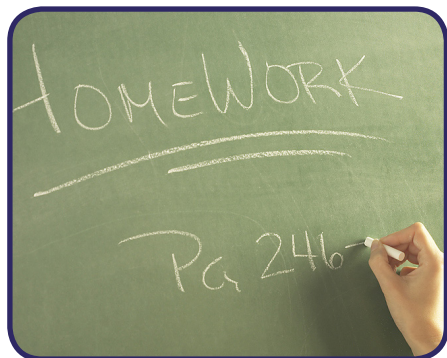

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE CONTINUED...

2019-2020 BUDGET SEASON:

The school year is more than half over and we are looking forward to the budget planning season for next year. This is an ever changing evaluation of programs, staffing needs and fiscal health of the Franklinville Central School District. My goal as Superintendent is simple. Provide the highest quality of educational programs while maintaining fiscal stability and strength. I am proud to represent a Board of Education that shares this same vision and works diligently to maintain consistently low tax levies on the community. As the spring months approach and initial projections for the budget are put out to the public, I would ask that you take an active role in support of our school district's vision.



STATE TESTING/ EVERY STUDENT SUCCEEDS ACT (ESSA)

Families: As you may or not be aware New York State has implemented a fresh approach to student's success and testing. The commissioner's office recently put out a statement;

"Fundamentally, ESSA is about creating a set of interlocking strategies to promote educational equity by providing support to districts and schools as they work to ensure that every student succeeds. New York State is committed to ensuring that all students succeed and thrive in school no matter who they are, where they live, where they go to school, or where they come from."

As we approach April and May the state ELA/Math/Science test will be upon us once again. As your Superintendent, I can share with you that we as a staff are going to make great efforts to make this process as routine as possible for our students. I look forward to how our kids will perform, and the instructional adjustments we need to make as a faculty to help them be successful. I have attached a link for you to familiarize yourself with the new ESSA requirements and below a list of categories of designations.

Under ESSA, schools receive one of three designations: In Good Standing, Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI), or Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI). Districts are designated as either In Good Standing or Target Districts. Both CSI and TSI schools are eligible for additional support. When low-performing schools fail to improve, they can be placed into Receivership, and if a school in Receivership does not make Demonstrable Improvement, the school may be assigned an Independent Receiver. Needless to say FCSD is looking to achieve a "Good Standing" rating. Staff, students and families together can achieve this.

UNDERSTANDING THE NEXT-GENERATION ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS AND MATH STANDARDS

In September 2017, the NYS Board of Regents adopted the Next-Generation Learning Standards. These standards were the result of a collaborative process among various stakeholders, including parents, teachers, and other experts in the field, to revise the Common Core Learning Standards. The main focus of this work was to ensure that all of the English Language Arts and Math standards were developmentally appropriate for students, while still maintaining a rigorous curriculum. Additional guidance was provided to educators to inform them on how best to implement the standards while meeting the needs of students with disabilities and English Language Learners.

For **English Language Arts**, the following are some highlights about the changes that were made:

- ▶ The addition of Lifelong Practices for Readers and Writers: These were included to promote lifelong practices educators hope to instill in their students, such as reading for pleasure and experimenting and playing with language.

- ▶ Reading for Information Standards and Reading for Literature Standards were combined to eliminate repetitive standards.

- ▶ The development of an Early Learning Task Force: This task force is specifically examining the learning needs of students in grades PreK-2.

- ▶ Grade-level expectations for text complexity have been revised.

For **Math**, the following are some highlights about the changes that were made:

- ▶ Some standards were moved to different grade levels: Major grade movements

occurred in statistics and probability at the middle school level and in algebra at the high school level.

- ▶ Some standards were added, revised, or consolidated to provide better clarity and coherence.

- ▶ The development of a glossary of commonly used math verbs.

Over the next coming months, our teachers will continue to build awareness around the new standards. Starting in the spring and into next year, teachers will examine their curriculum to confirm alignment to the Next-Generation Learning Standards. Students will not be assessed on these standards until Spring 2021.

It's hard to believe Spring is just around the corner. Just a reminder that all students should be checking the **scholarship** page about once a month to see what scholarships you might be eligible for (there are even 7-8 scholarships available to those students **grades 3-11** each year). **SENIORS:** You should be checking this page DAILY! Scholarships can be found on our web page under "Services", "Guidance and Counseling", "Post-secondary Scholarships", or "Graduation Awards".

COMMUNITY SERVICE: any students needing community service hours should check with Ms. Rhoades for ideas.

JUNIORS AND SENIORS:

REQUIREMENTS: release of information sheet signed by a parent, and a **resume** listing all your activities, sports and community services must be turned in to the Guidance Office. **Seniors also need two letters of recommendation and senior proficiencies.** Senior proficiencies will not be handed out until the fourth quarter. If you haven't filled out your FAFSA forms please do so as soon as possible, regardless of income. **Please make sure to bring in a copy of each college acceptance letter and any scholarship you are awarded.** Please don't hesitate to contact me in the Guidance Office at (716) 676-8054 or at crhoades@tbafcs.org at any time.

JUNIORS: All Juniors should be registered to take the SAT and/or ACT this Spring/Summer. **If you bring me a copy of your username and password after you register I will keep it in your file so if you forget I can help you with it.** Again, fee waivers are available for those who qualify, just ask Ms. Rhoades. Remember that you can use the free Kahn Academy to prepare for the SAT.

DEPARTMENT NEWS:

In January only a small group of Juniors took the ACCUPLACER. This is a college entrance exam that allows students to take college level courses. JEN DELONG MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP:

When Jennifer DeLong passed away in June at just 36 years old, her family — parents Ken and Sue DeLong and siblings Teresa and Kevin — almost immediately made the decision to establish a scholarship in her memory.

The scholarship was set up first at Franklinville Central School/Ten Broeck Academy, Jennifer's alma mater, and then later established under the management of the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation, joining several other scholarships at the school district.

Jennifer graduated from Franklinville Central School in 2000. An avid problem-solver with an aptitude for math led her to a degree in computer science from SUNY @ Fredonia.

After graduation she found success as a computer programmer working for government contractors.

Despite a demanding career she never gave up her love of music. It began during her time at Franklinville Central School, where she was in both band and chorus and participated in many Solo Festivals and All-County and Area All-State Concerts. She continued to play piano volunteering her talents for local theater productions as well as a middle school chorus.

The scholarship bearing her name will support students with similar passions at her alma mater.

The \$1,000 scholarship will be for a graduating senior from Ten Broeck Acad-

emy/Franklinville Central School District who is pursuing a career or demonstrates excellence in STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) and music subject areas. All applicants who apply will be considered, however, preference will be given to a female graduate. Reference letters and a list of extracurricular activities should address the student's academic excellence or participation in STEM subject areas and band and/or choral music. As part of the standard goal statement to be submitted with the application, the student should include information on his/her academic and career goal.

The first scholarship will be awarded in 2019.



READ BETWEEN THE LINES

Learning to infer, or "**read between the lines**," is one key to good reading comprehension. Consider these tips for helping your child make inferences.

Describe the setting. Pick a book, and read a few sentences to your child (without him looking). Leave out words that name the setting. Example: "Sand stretched in all directions...cacti dotted the landscape." Can he infer where the story is set? If he isn't sure, give him a hint. ("Where do you see lots of sand and cacti?")

Look for lessons. Fables are great for reading between the lines. Read one by Aesop, and help your child figure out the lesson. For instance, The Tortoise and the Hare teaches that even if you're slow, you can win if you just keep going. Have your child point out parts that he used to make his inference. ("The tortoise never stopped, and he took one good step after another.")

Use Prompts. Questions that start with "Why do you think...?" or "How do you know...?" can encourage your child to infer. You might ask why he thinks a character behaved the way he did or how he knows it's going to snow. Together, look for clues in the book that may help him answer the questions.
