From the Desk of the Superintendent...

Hello Franklinville Families: As I write this article, I am very encouraged by how the 2020-21 school year has begun. Prior to the first day, I had the same trepidation that many of you had when the time came to make the decision to open our doors for the benefit for all. As I review the first five weeks of school many of those concerns have been addressed and handled appropriately. Franklinville Central School District maintains a healthy respect for the potential volatility of the coronavirus, but we also fully understand the importance of educating our children. All of our students from grades PK-12 have been respectful, responsible and courteous to the new rules in place regarding social distancing and mask wearing. The staff at FCSD understands that our protocols will be challenged and adjusted as we learn how to function within our new norm. I look forward to the remainder of the year and being able to open our doors to our kids on a daily basis.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

As you enter our grounds you have probably noticed a significant amount of construction being completed. In both of our buildings, updates are being done to our bathrooms, additional classroom space and mechanical upgrades. Priority is now being placed on the south entrance of the Elementary school. We will be working with our architect and contractors to shut down the south entrance way for 4-5 weeks and re-route our traffic patterns to accommodate the need for uninterrupted construction access to the space. In the box to the right, is the new traffic pattern while construction is taking place. We are looking for a completion date of early November for this work.

All *elementary* car riders and walkers will enter/exit through the main entrance.

Finally, as the weather begins to change, and hopefully the school year continues, I look forward to the upcoming days and taking on the challenges together. Please stay safe and healthy!

MORNING DROP:

- ➤ Vehicles will enter through Riggs St, proceed toward the building, enter the bus loop (opposite current traffic flow) from the South end and drop off in front of the main entrance.
- ► After dropping off, vehicles will then proceed out the North entrance onto Route 16.
- ► Walkers will enter the school grounds off of Route 16, cross at the crosswalk and proceed to the main entrance.



AFTERNOON PICK-UP:

- Vehicles will still enter the Riggs Street entrance and the Car Rider Pro system will identify cars.
- Cars will proceed toward the building, enter the bus loop (opposite current traffic flow) from the
- ► South end and pickup North of the main entrance using the same system we currently use.
- ► Walkers will enter off of Route 16, cross at the crosswalk, and proceed to the main entrance where you will follow the current procedure of check-in.

JUNIORS AND SENIORS:

During the first couple of weeks of school, Mr. Sylvester and/or Mr. Harris met with you in small groups to go over an additional packet of information filled with materials regarding deadlines, tests, requirements, scholarships, financial aid, and other important things. There were a few additional pages you must have signed and brought back in. Parents please ask your child about these important packets. **DO NOT MISS DEADLINES!** Listen to the announcements especially about free college classes and other important items.

Junior Requirements: Juniors will need to turn in a records release form and a resume. Your counselor will meet with you to discuss this but resumes must be turned in by the first week in January in order to be considered for junior awards/scholarships. The PSAT was offered in October and the results are expected back in December.

Seniors: Have you registered to take the SAT or ACT yet? I know everyone is a little behind due to all the cancellations of tests last spring and summer but all registrations are now open. Hopefully by now you have established your College Board account and started the application for scholarship opportunities. If you bring Mrs. Irwin a copy of your username and password after you register we will keep it in your file so if you forget it we can help you with it. Again, fee waivers are available for those who qualify, just ask Mr. Harris. Remember that you can use the free Kahn Academy to prepare for the SAT

Senior Requirements: In addition to the records release and resume, you are required to turn in two letters of recommendation. Please get them in as soon as possible. Senior proficiency sheets will be handed out in late May. Just remember your resume is one of them so make sure we have an updated copy right away. All seniors should fill out the FAFSA which opened in October, regardless of income or current college plans. Please make sure to bring in a copy of each college acceptance letter and any scholarship you are awarded throughout the year.



KATHY JOWSEY SPIRIT SCHOLARSHIP

Kathy Jowsey was a beloved figure in Franklinville. In high school, she could be found in the stands at every game, cheering loudly. Car horns could often be heard around her house as passersby always wanted to greet their loved friend. Later in life, she could always be found around town, often recognized from afar by her distinct, jovial laugh.





Jowsey, who graduated from Franklinville Central School/Ten Broeck Academy, worked at Motorola Inc. in Arcade for nearly 40 years, but she never wanted to move from her home in Franklinville and the community she loved, said lifelong friend Sue Maffei of Franklinville. "When she was at Motorola, she always got there early. She worked overtime. She always worked so hard," said Maffei. "When Motorola moved, she wouldn't move because she didn't want to leave Franklinville. So she went to work for Merit Tool in Ellicottville for lesser pay, and she was probably 59, but she did it because her work ethic was amazing." When she retired, Jowsey, always the good neighbor, helped transport people to doctor's appointments in Olean and Buffalo.

In honor of that hard-working spirit, the scholarship is intended to support a student who may not have the most outstanding grades, but has worked hard to achieve their level of academic success. Maffei said she hopes the scholarship will be part of the support system for students that Jowsey lacked during her time in school. "She was very proud of what she became. She worked hard for everything she had," Maffei said. "But she never went to college, and she could have. She just didn't have the support system to push her there. "I hope this means a lot to the recipient," said Maffei. "That someone cares a lot for the kids who want to go to college that may have a hard time doing so otherwise."

After Jowsey passed away in 2017, Maffei and her husband Alva Lockwoord, found that Jowsey had requested a scholarship be established through her estate, with the request written on a piece of paper. Per Jowseys' request, the scholarship will be for graduates of Ten Broeck Academy/Franklinville High School who demonstrate financial need who have worked hard academically and exemplify school spirit through extracurricular activities, sports and/or volunteerism. Preference will be for a student majoring in business, accounting, sports management or journalism.

The scholarship award, which will be made for the first time in 2021, will be a minimum of \$1,000 annually. As for Jowsey's spirit, the class vice president of 1973 is maybe best remembered by her infectious and distinguished laugh. "You always knew when Jowsey was around because she had a laugh that could carry 20 miles," said Maffei. "You could hear her laugh in Olean." Maffei remembered one instance that summarized Jowsey's spirit and her importance to Franklinville.

"She went to California to Disneyland one time with a friend from work," remembered Maffei. "When she was there, she was laughing, and someone was up on a flagpole changing the flag. She happened to be from Franklinville, so she yelled 'Kathy Jowsey, I know you're down there. I hear that laughter!'"

For students that embody Jowsey's spirit and love of place, the Kathy Jowsey Spirit Memorial Scholarship will be a voice encouraging them to work hard, laugh often and love their home for many years to come. 2020 FALL SPORTS SEASON

With the start date of fall sports in NYS pushed back due to Covid 19, most of our fall athletes began their practices on September 1st. This year, we have modified and varsity girls soccer, modified and varsity boys/girls cross country, and we have girls swimming with Olean and Portville. The modified, jv, and varsity football season has been pushed back until March 1st. This included football cheerleading.

During these strange times, our coaches and athletes are being very diligent in maintaining a safe and healthy environment for all involved. The coaches are following safety protocols set forth by the state and the students are doing a great job at working hard to prepare for their opening games and meets, while following all safety rules.

Generally, I would invite the public out to watch our athletes in action. But, due to the pandemic, the state guidelines allow only 2 spectators per athlete. This rule will be strictly followed where each of these spectators will be required to wear their pass and will need to wear a mask whenever they enter or exit the field areas. Once seated or stationary, if socially distanced at 6' or more, the masks may be removed. Upon leaving or moving, or if the 6' distance is breached, the mask will need to be worn again. 6' social distancing seating will be required for all spectators who do not reside in the same household.

At this time, all modified and varsity soccer games will be played on the football field and the cross country meets will start behind this same field. Spectators can sit in the stands or bring their own chairs to sit around the fencing.



Fight Flu at Home and School

Flu, or influenza, spreads easily and can make people very sick, especially kids. You can help stop flu!

Flu symptoms include:

Fever or chills, body aches, cough, sore throat, headache, runny or stuffy nose, feeling very tired. Some people, especially children, may have stomach problems and diarrhea. Unlike a cold, the flu comes on very suddenly.

Prevent flu!

- Flu vaccine is the best protection against the flu. It is recommended every year for everyone 6 months and older.
- Get the flu vaccine for you and your children every year! It helps make flu sickness milder or prevents it all together.
- Getting the vaccine early in the fall means you and your children will be protected when flu season starts.
- Ask people close to your children, like babysitters and relatives, to get the vaccine, too.
- The vaccine is especially important for people with certain health conditions, like asthma, diabetes, heart or lung conditions because the flu can make them even sicker

If your child gets the flu:

- · Your child will need plenty of rest and lots of fluids.
- Keep your child home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without using fever-control medicine. This helps avoid giving the flu to others.
- Talk with your child's health care provider before giving a child any overthe-counter medicine.
- Never give your child or teenager aspirin or any medicine that has aspirin in it. Aspirin can cause serious problems.
- If your child gets flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a medical condition like asthma, diabetes, or heart or lung disease, call their health care provider. Young children and those with certain medical conditions are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. Ask their health care provider if they recommend an antiviral drug.
- If you are worried about your child, call their health care provider.

Don't spread flu!

- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- If soap and water aren't handy, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hands. Put used tissues in the trash.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. That's how germs spread.
- Stay away from people who are sick.
