FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT...

Incredibly half of the school year is now behind us. Together we have worked to put the District in the best possible scenario to help our kids! Recently we have adjusted our hybrid schedule from four in person days to five full days every other week, and to date it has worked well. Per previous messages to the community, we will continue to look to expand back to a full five day in person schedule following an analysis of the Covid virus transmission rates. We are looking to complete this shift back to “normal” following the April break. In the meantime, we continue to press forward and do what’s best for our kids, staff and families. Thank you for your continued support.

WINTER/SPRING SPORTS UPDATE

As winter begins to slow down and spring starts waking up, I am pleased that sports are going to be re-introduced to our students. Franklinville Central School District is a member of Section VI athletics. They are the governing body which guides all of the participating districts through all of the sports seasons within a school year. As of today, they have determined that spectators will not be allowed to attend events due to a number of safety concerns for all. Below are the projected adjusted sports schedules:

- **Winter Low Risk Sports** – Start Date is January 18th for Low & Moderate Risk
- **2020-2021 Indoor Track and Field Season** is Cancelled
- **Winter High Risk Sports** – Basketball, Swim & Ice Hockey Season, Start Date is February 1st, and calendars are under construction
- **Fall 2 Sports** – Football, Cheer and Volleyball, Start Date is March 22nd, End Date is May 15th
- **Spring Sports** – Start Date is May 10th, End Date is June 30th

NEW YORK STATE ASSESSMENT EXAMS

Finally I would like to address the many questions surrounding NY State Assessments for the 2020-21 school year. The current status of state exams as of this article are still in flux. However I am able to provide the community with some incite regarding what is happening at this time. In a statement from Board of Regents Chancellor Young:

“Throughout the pandemic the Board’s priority has been the physical and mental health, safety, and well-being of the children and adults in our schools,”. “In light of the ongoing pandemic, we have determined that the Spring 2021 state assessments cannot be safely, equitably and fairly administered to students in schools across the state and, therefore, are seeking these waivers.”

To date the State has submitted to the Fed a waiver which would waive our responsibility of testing all students in the spring. Until then, the District will push forward without educational programs and continue to support what is best for this community and the children we are responsible for. Best Wishes to All!

CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION UPDATE



The district has implemented a few different programs across all grade levels to meet the social emotional learning needs of students and to coordinate our efforts into a shared approach.

In the Spring of 2018 and 2019, New York State introduced guidance to the districts about Social Emotional Learning. Their guidance focused on 3 goals for students:

1. Develop self-awareness and self-management skills essential to success in school and in life.
2. Use social awareness and interpersonal skills to establish and maintain positive relationships.

3. Demonstrate ethical decision-making skills and responsible behaviors in personal, school, and community contexts.

We are introducing some new curriculum this school year. The *Michigan Model for Health™* is a comprehensive, skills-based health education curriculum that shares our goal of helping young people live happier and healthier lives.

This nationally recognized curriculum is research based and aligned to standards. Using a building-block approach to health education, the *Michigan Model for Health™* addresses the major youth health risk behaviors at every grade level, with age-appropriate instructional activities.

The curriculum will be taught in a few different methods utilizing a variety of providers or instructors. The implementation will be different according to the grade levels as we instruct the students in 7 major categories:

1. Social and Emotional Health
2. Nutrition and Physical Activity
3. Safety
4. Alcohol, Tobacco, and other drugs
5. Personal Health and Wellness
6. Healthy & Responsible Relationships
7. Skills for Health & Life

The instruction of this curriculum will be a community approach involving our staff and supportive agencies: School Counselor(s), School Resource Officer, School Nurse(s), Health Education Teacher(s), Physical Education Teacher(s), Erie 2 BOCES, County Department of Health, our local Fire Department, etc...



In the spring, we will be running our first annual **Social Emotional Learning Survey** with our students and staff. The survey is hosted by a website called PanoramaEd.com, a social emotional surveying tool.

These ongoing programs will assist us in providing a supportive environment for your child to succeed in school and in life, have positive relationships, and demonstrate responsible decision-making in their community.

TBA as a whole has been very lucky in that we are in person more than remote. As the snow starts to melt we can only hope that we get closer to our normal activities. In the meantime keep your chin up and look to the bright side. Being positive and trying to find the good in each situation not only positively affects you but others as well.

COMMUNITY SERVICE:

Any students needing community service hours should check with Ms. Rhoades or Mr. Harris for ideas. I know it has been a little tough lately but it's important you keep giving back to your community.

ELEMENTARY NEWS:

Since we have rolled into 2021 we have focused on the Character Traits of Self-Control and Honesty. We are so proud of all of our Elementary students for working so hard to learn about and demonstrate these important traits.

Mrs. Layton has been making rounds to classrooms, so your child may come home talking about how we discussed managing strong feelings, using manners and building positive friendships. 3rd, 4th and 5th Grade Students have access to a TEAMS page called Guidance/Counseling. This is an additional way for our Counselor, Mrs. Layton to reach out and connect to students. Please remind your child to check their Guidance/Counseling Teams page and complete/respond to posted materials.

MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS:

Ms. Rhoades has continued to work on college and career readiness activities with the students. All the 8th & 9th graders, as well as most of the 7th graders, now have an account with Guidance Direct. This site helps them with interest inventories, career searches, college searches, scholarships, resumes and more.

All the students have been given laptops and should be used to the differences with them over the iPads. All students should now be familiar with their Teams account and how to find their daily work whether they are in school or out. Teachers post assignments daily to the accounts so if a student needs to miss school they know where to find their work and can be caught up and ready to go when they come back to school. Parents can check to see if their children are caught up with work by checking the teams account on the students' laptop. If you are not sure how to do this, please feel free to call Ms. Rhoades and she can walk you through it. Remember we now have an after school study hall on Mondays, Tuesdays & Thursdays from 2:25-3:25 for any student wanting a quiet place to do their homework or anyone needing any help. We also have extra help available on remote Wednesdays so just call Ms. Rhoades to set that up. We are really looking forward to being in person all 5 days a week!

Sometime in March the 8th graders will get a virtual tour and career exploration activity for the Career and Technical Education Programs available in high school. Generally every year we take the 8th graders on a tour of BOCES (Career & Technical Education) but with covid-19, they have designed a way for us to tour it virtually. Ms. Rhoades will be working with the 8th graders to do this. As of right now it is not looking too good for us taking the 8th graders to Houghton College or the 9th graders to Pitt-Bradford or SBU but we are putting some things in the works in place of them this year. RACHEL'S CHALLENGE:

Currently they are working on plans for the annual Seniors vs. Staff Volleyball game which is generally held in March but we have moved to the end of Spring waiting to hear what we can and can't do to make sure we keep everyone safe. These scholarships are due by APRIL 1, 2021

1. ROBERT KELSEY SCHOLARSHIP AWARD – Interested students who plan to further their education in a medical field. Letter of intent should be addressed to the attention of the Superintendent's Office for committee selection. This is a \$50 award, which is subject to change and is paid at the graduation ceremony. Submit letter of Intent to Mrs. Irwin in the Guidance Office by April 1, 2021.

2. GERTRUDE AND LEWIS DILLE SCHOLARSHIP AWARD - \$500 awarded to a student who will be continuing their education in a career that will benefit children, such as teaching or social sciences. 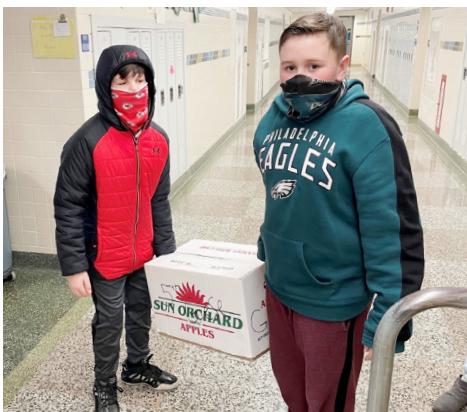
PRE-K REGISTRATION

DROP-OFF/PICK-UP REMINDERS

Please take a minute to review our drop-off and pickup procedures at the South Entrance. Your cooperation in following these procedures will ensure that all students arrive and are dismissed safely and efficiently.

MORNING DROP-OFF

Cars should pull forward the full length of the sidewalk at the South Entrance. Students will not be allowed in the building before 8:25. If you arrive before that time, please remain with your child until 8:25. After the cars in front of you have unloaded, please pull forward in a single file line. Do not drive around stopped cars or get out of the line once you are in it.

AFTERNOON PICK-UP

Enter through Riggs Street and proceed to the South entrance. Have your tag displayed on the mirror. Do not hang additional items next to your tag as it disrupts the signal. If you do not have your tag you will be asked to pull forward or park while we retrieve your child.

Load all children on the passenger side. Staff are not allowed to leave the sidewalk or load children in the vehicle.

The key piece for all of this is to remain patient during the drop-off and pick-up process. Thank you in advance for helping us maintain a safe arrival and dismissal for our children.

HIBERNATION DAY

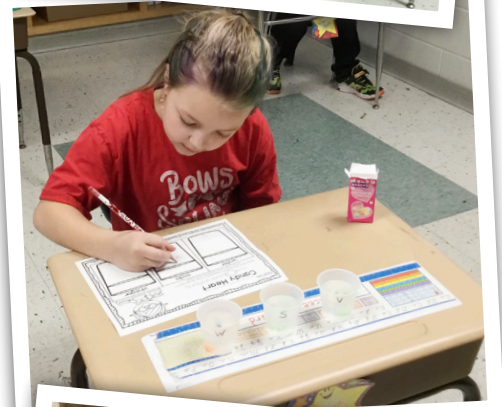
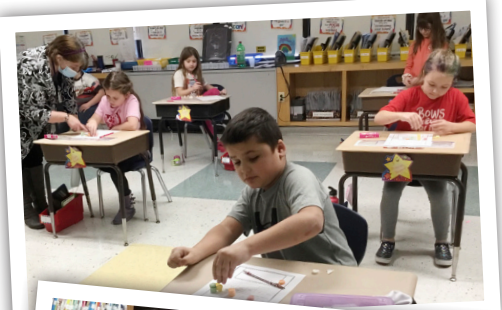
Kindergarteners were studying hibernation. They spent a whole day on hibernation activities including creating their own little “dens.”
