CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION UPDATE

When teaching reading to our students, we use a variety of supports, resources, and programs in the instruction. Two major programs are the Fountas & Pinnell Literacy Continuum (F&P) in the Elementary School and the Independent Reading Leveled Assessment (IRLA) system in Middle/High School. These systems provide detailed goal-setting processes for the teachers when instructing students, so the students know what they are working towards.

Using either system, we determine 2 different reading levels for a student. They are a student's **Independent Reading Level** and a student's **Instructional Reading Level**.

A student's **Independent Reading Level** is a level in which students can read "on their own" without any assistance or accommodations. Books at this level are used to build a child's confidence in reading and to reinforce the skills. Children should be able to read 99-100% of the words in the books at this level. We hope that students will be able to read 10-15 minutes every day from a book at their independent reading level.

A student's **Instructional Reading Level** is a level in which teachers instruct students during small group reading time (Guided Reading). The teacher analyzes deficits in reading skills (Comprehension, Phonics, Vocabulary Acquisition, Fluency, Phonemic Awareness) and provides instruction to increase the student's ability in those areas of deficit. Students should be able to read most of the words in these books. They should not make more than 3-4 errors on a page. These books are used to teach, work on their reading goals, and challenge students. These books are used to raise a student's Independent Reading Level. Students will need assistance or accommodations when reading this level of books, as it could be frustrating to read on their own.

For students who need some assistance, we have additional programs that are used to supplement our reading programs. The first is called the Sonday System and the other is called the Barton Reading Program. These programs are used alongside the F&P and IRLA systems to reteach or train the students in very particular skill deficits they may have in reading. These programs are based on an instructional approach called Orton-Gillingham, which is a direct, explicit, multisensory, and structured way to teach literacy when reading, writing, and spelling does not come easily to individuals, such as those with dyslexia.

Happy Spring! Here's to hoping the weather warms up and the snow is going away soon. It sure has been a cold winter so far.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEWS:

We made it through another Western NY Winter and have now passed the 100th day of school! During January and February, we had some fun things happening here at the Elementary School. We've focused on the Character Trait, KINDNESS! Some of our 5th Graders have shared ideas for Random Acts of Kindness on the morning announcements and I have seen great examples of KINDNESS throughout the building over the past couple of months. I have noticed students holding doors open for others. using good manners by saying "please" and "thank you," and offering to help by returning trays, as just a few examples. As we move forward into March, we will focus on RESPECT and then RESPONSIBILITY for April and May.

All 5th Grade students have had the opportunity to meet with Mrs. Layton to check-in and talk about how the school year is going as well as discuss their interest in band/chorus for next year. As the end of the 21-22 school year moves closer, we will have more information to share about transitioning 5th graders to the Middle/High School, visits to TBA, and orientation.

MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS:

All students in grades 6-7 have had a scheduling meeting with Ms. Rhoades so ask your child if they decided to take Band and/or Chorus next year. Remember that all students have <u>TEN DAYS</u> into the new school year to change their schedule. After the first 10 days of classes each year, we do not permit schedule changes.

The 8th graders will be attending a College and Career Readiness trip to the Ellicottville BOCES Center on March 15th. In their Technology class, they watched a presentation about the Center and all the classes there. Students then picked six individual classes that they would visit to learn more about those particular career fields. This trip is designed to learn about career fields instead of "choosing to attend" the center in high school. As Sophomores, they will get the opportunity to go back to the Center to see if there is a class they may be interested in attending. Permission slips for this trip have been sent home.

Over the last two years, most of our field trips for College and Career Readiness had to be cancelled due to covid restrictions, but we are working hard at getting these in-person trips back a little at a time. Currently, Ms. Rhoades is working on getting the 6th and 7th graders

to the ROPES course in the Spring. The 8th graders will be attending the annual Houghton College visit on May 3rd, where they will get a tour of the college campus, learn about college, and learn the skills they need to develop in high school to be successful at college. More information will be forthcoming with these events.

The Catt. County Youth Court is willing to provide more training at our school for students interested in participating. Just see Ms. Rhoades on how to sign up for the next training.

The Advisement class started for 6th & 7th graders this school year has been a huge success. We are very excited to extend this class to the 8th graders next school year. We have seen an improvement in grades, attendance, and behaviors with the students that have taken this awesome new class.

Speaking of attendance, Ms. Rhoades has many incentives at the junior high to continue to improve students' attendance. Attendance and completing homework are the top two behaviors that ensure



success in education. Each quarter she awards the advisement group with the best attendance for the class. 2 out of 15 groups received a special treat (donuts) for perfect attendance in the first quarter. In the second quarter, 5 out of 15 groups tied for perfect class attendance, and they had ice cream floats to celebrate. She hopes that even more groups will participate in the reward in this third quarter. In quarter 2, all the students, grades 6-8 with perfect school attendance (including remote learners that were quarantined) got to put their names into a drawing for a prize. We had 17 eligible students! For the second quarter, the winner of the electronic thesaurus was Ethan Learn. Ethan is a 6th grader at TBA. Congratulations Ethan!

Boys & Girls grades six and up: Do you enjoy camping, being outdoors, doing community service, and other amazing activities? Think about joining Boy Scout Troop 601. Stop in to see Ms. Rhoades, and she can give you any information you need. The troop meets on Mondays at the Franklinville VFW, from 6-7:30, so it doesn't generally interfere with sports!

HIGH SCHOOL NEWS:

I hope all is well. I enjoy meeting with the 8th grade students to get to know them and work with them to develop their schedules for next year. The 9th grade students recently completed a career exploration activity and learned more about how their interests, strengths, and skills connect to various career fields.

On Tuesday, March 15th, Sophomores will

take the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) CEP – a complete career planning program – in school. Students take the ASVAB at no cost and no commitment to military service. The ASVAB CEP also provides an interest assessment and planning tools to help students explore career field entry requirements and various career paths, both military and civilian. Students will meet with a representative to review their scores and complete a career exploration activity on Tuesday, March 22nd.

Juniors and Seniors will have the opportunity to tour the JCC Olean campus in April. More information is forthcoming. Seniors: Please remember to submit a copy of your resume, recommendation letters, and records release as soon as possible. Seniors also need to complete 12 hours of community service. Scholarships are available and can be found on our website: https://www.tbafcs.org/Page/2000. The Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation Scholarship portal is open – the deadline is March 20th. The Franklinville Graduation Awards are available to all Seniors - the deadline is April 1st. Third-quarter grades are included in the Senior Final Class Rank.
