INTRODUCING PRIMARY PROJECT

I would like to introduce an exciting a new program at Franklinville Elementary called Primary Project. We have been working hard to bring this opportunity to our school, get the space set up, and diligently participating in training sessions to kick off its implementation.

ABOUT PRIMARY PROJECT

Primary Project is a Tier 2 school-based program for children displaying mild to moderate school adjustment difficulties such as withdrawal, shy behaviors, mild acting out behaviors, and potential learning challenges. The goal of Primary

HOT BREAKFAST IS BACK!

Students are back eating breakfast in the cafeteria this year. Breakfast is available for all students between 7:20 and 7:50 daily in our cafeteria.

HALLOWEEN PARADE

The Halloween Parade will be on October 31st at 1 p.m. Weather permitting, the parade will be held outside for families to enjoy. We ask that if you plan on picking your child up after the parade, you send a note ahead of time. For the safety and security of our students, we ask that parents and family members refrain from wearing costumes. Students should not wear their costumes to school. They will have time to change after lunch.



Project is to enhance social, emotional, behavioral, and learning skills while reducing social, emotional, and school adjustment difficulties in preschool through 2nd grade children. Promoting good mental health during these early years will establish developmental competencies that will positively contribute to children's school readiness and engagement as well as improve positive lifelong development.

STUDENT SELECTION

In order to determine student eligibility, several factors are considered. The Primary Project Team will use a scientifically tested screening measure to gather information from classroom teachers on their student population. The Primary Project Coordinator and/ or Supervisor will observe children in both the classroom and other natural settings. Parent referrals are taken into consideration as well. Parental permission will always be obtained in order for a child to participate in the Primary Project Program.

AFTER-SCHOOL PLAYGROUND EXPECTATIONS.

For everyone's safety and enjoyment of the school playground, I would like to remind everyone of the following expectations.

- Adult supervision is required at all times. Unsupervised children will be asked to leave school grounds.
- Playground equipment/area is designed for children between 2 and 12.
- Public use of the playground is limited to times when school is not in session.
- Proper attire, including shirts and shoes, is required at all times on school grounds.
- Vulgar or foul language is prohibited.
- Animals are prohibited on school grounds.
- School grounds are a drug and alcoholfree zone. This includes the use of e-cigarettes and vapes.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation. Have a great fall. Stay safe, and I look forward to seeing you all soon.

THE PROGRAMMING

Child participants will meet weekly with the Primary Project's Child Associate in the designated program space. This person has been specially trained to use developmentally appropriate child-led play as a means to provide a timely, effective intervention. The Child Associate will work closely with and under the supervision of a Mental Health Professional, our School Counselor, Mrs. Jennifer Layton. The intervention session schedule runs for 12-15 weeks, on average, but the time frame is ultimately determined by the student's need.

TOP 5 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT AIS

- 1. AIS stands for Academic Intervention Services.
- 2.<u>ALL</u> students are a part of Tier 1 where they ALL receive the same grade level, core instruction. Tiers 2 & 3 are supplemental instruction provided as needed.
- 3. When determining if a student is in need of extra support, many factors are considered. Teachers gather to study data from the student's academic performance. This data could be from tests, class work/ participation, or a teacher/ parent recommendation.
- 4. If a student is in need of extra support to show grade level expectations then the student may be put into AIS where they would receive small group instruction, tailored to their specific needs to bridge the gap and bring them back up to grade level without missing core instruction in the classroom.
- 5. The length of time in AIS depends on the time it takes to bridge that gap. All students' progress is monitored and reviewed every 8 weeks or less. Then it is determined if a student has made enough progress to leave AIS or if a change in their AIS is necessary.

We are focused on the success of all our students and we know that they all can learn and succeed, just not all on the same day.

Regarding Sportsmanship, It's Time for Wake-up Call in High School Sports

Rrom time to time, everyone needs a wake-up call to get back on course, to regain focus and to "get with the program." That time is at hand in high school sports as it relates to unsportsmanlike conduct.

In the 103-year history of the NFHS and organized sports in the United States, good sportsmanship has been one of the most important outcomes of these programs. When appropriate behavior occurs, competitive play is more enjoyable for everyone.

And for some individuals recently, the games have not been enjoyable. In the past few months, following are some of the unfortunate incidents that have occurred at the high school level:

- The mayor of a city was ejected from his daughter's high school basketball game after threatening a referee.
- A volleyball official was followed off the court by a coach who was shouting obscenities.
- A referee was assaulted and knocked unconscious during a basketball tournament.
- A student from the opposing school in the stands shouted racist comments at a high school basketball player on the court.
- At another game in another state, inappropriate chants were made against the opposing team's players on the court.
- While it was at a lower level, continued poor parent behavior in the stands led a Central New York youth basketball league to end the season early.

Unfortunately, the list could go on and on. When hearing accounts like these and many others that regularly occur, the primary reason for the current officials' shortage becomes painfully obvious – unacceptable behavior on the part of coaches, parents and other spectators. While all of these displays of unacceptable behavior must stop, the recent occurrences of students and other spectators using hurtful, demeaning and hateful language at individuals on the opposing team is heartbreaking.

High school sports and other activities exist to lift people up, not demean or tear people down. The goal is to treat everyone equally and treat each other with respect. Any speech or harassment that is insulting, demeaning or hurtful will not be tolerated.

High schools must establish a culture that values the worth of every single person – both players on the school's team and players on the opposing team. There must be a no-tolerance policy regarding behavior that shows disrespect for another individual.

Likewise, the accounts of violent attacks against officials are incomprehensible and must be stopped. As Dana Pappas, NFHS director of officiating services, said, "Do you really think that these individuals who are volunteers are going to take a halfday off of work, get paid less than they're probably making at their real job to go and be unfair in a game? It doesn't make sense. They are there to give back. They are there to be community servants."

NFHS playing rules are written to encourage sportsmanship. Participation in these programs should promote respect, integrity and sportsmanship. However, for these ideals to occur, everyone involved must do their part.

Because of a concern that unsporting behavior in education-based athletics has increased the past year, the NFHS has made sportsmanship the No. 1 Point of Emphasis in all sports for the 2022-23 season.

And if there was ever a doubt, the recent unfortunate events at the college level should make it crystal clear that the person most responsible for setting the tone at high school athletic contests is the coach(es).



If coaches act in a sportsmanlike manner, their behavior sets the tone for players, spectators and others. If coaches, however, are constantly complaining about the decision of contest officials, spectators are more likely to do the same.

There must be a collaborative, working relationship between contest officials and game administration to promote good sportsmanship and safely conduct the contest. Everyone has their roles to play in creating a positive, sportsmanlike atmosphere at contests.

Officials should focus on the actions of players, coaches and other bench/ sideline personnel. A positive, open line of communication between officials and coaches ultimately results in a better contest for everyone involved.

Contest officials, however, should never engage with spectators who are exhibiting unsporting behavior. Once the contest begins, school administration is responsible for dealing with unruly spectators. A proactive approach by school administration includes monitoring the behavior of spectators and intervening as needed.

If spectators are using demeaning or profane language at officials – or at others in the stands – those individuals must be removed from the contest by school administration.

Rather than spectators like the ones described above, more fans are needed at high school sporting events. Fans support the officials, the players and the coaches, unlike the fanatics who tear down and do harm to the participants, the school and the community.

Good sports win with humility, lose with grace and do both with dignity. It takes the efforts of everyone every day to ensure that sportsmanship remains one of the top priorities in education-based activity programs.

Time for a Story

Want to spend time with your youngster, build his/her reading skills, and help him/her learn to love books? You can do all three when you read aloud to your child.

Reading regularly

Try to read to your child every day. You might aim for 10-15 minutes of bedtime reading for a peaceful end to the day. Bring along a book, and read to him/her during a sibling's sports practice. Or curl up together with a book when you get home from work.



Take turns choosing books

Your youngster may want to hear old favorites again and again. Use your turn for new titles and variety (nonfiction, poetry).

Let him/her participate

Ask your child to turn the pages while you read. Also, your child may finish sentences that rhyme or fill in words they may know. Go slowly so your child has time to understand the story and look at the illustrations. Children will enjoy read aloud time more if they play an active role.

Be playful

You can use different voices for different characters (a high, squeaky voice for a mouse or a deep, booming voices for a horse) or substitute your youngster's name for the main character's name, and use family member's names for other characters. Note: You don't have to be an expert reader—your child will love it when you read aloud because it's you!
