## A MESSAGE FROM

MRS. SCHUCKHARDT
(LCSW) School Social Worker for grades 6-12
During the winter months it can be challenging to get outside or to get together with the people closest to us. Snowstorms, icy roads, and just general cold make it easier for us to stay inside rather than make plans to leave the house. During this time, we see an overall increase in social media use. While social media such as Instagram, Snapchat, Facebook, and YouTube can have some benefits such as keeping you connected to people and preventing loneliness, overuse can have negative effects as well.
Too much time engaged with social media can negatively impact your mental health significantly. It can make you feel lonely, isolated, and exacerbate overall anxiety and depression. "Since it's a relatively new technology, there's little research to establish the long-term consequences, good or bad, of social media use. However, multiple studies have found a strong link between heavy social media and an increased risk for depression, anxiety, loneliness, self-harm, and even suicidal thoughts." (Robinson and Smith, 2023).
If you're concerned that you or your child are overusing social media there are some signs you can look out for. If you notice that social media is being used to mask or distract from general feelings of anxiety and
general feelings of anxiety and
depression, if you are neglecting face to face relationships, it distracts you from school or work, or after use it leaves you feeling anxious, angry or depressed, social media may be negatively impacting you. Increased use can lead to feelings of comparing yourself to others and increased risk of cyberbullying as well.

Some things you can do to improve your relationship with social media are setting time limits for how long you engage with it and disabling notifications. You should actively set up engagements with friends and family to improve your face-to-face interactions. Taking time to engage in a physical hobby or exercise can improve your overall mental health as well. One of the best things you can do is take time to check in with yourself and express gratitude about the good things you have in your life. And as always, if you are experiencing any of these challenges, you can reach out to the counseling department, and we are more than happy to help connect you with resources and support you.

## Coach Smith

The speech delivered by head coach Jake Smith at TBA celebrating the Franklinville Panthers Wrestling Team and honoring the senior class conveyed heartfelt gratitude to the team and highlighted the valuable life lessons learned through wrestling. Coach Smith emphasized the inevitability of life's "last" moments, encouraging the seniors to embrace them with positivity. The six key lessons derived from wrestling experiences were outlined:
Courage: Coach Smith commended the wrestlers for displaying courage from their first step into the wrestling circle, encouraging them to carry that courage into facing life's uncertainties.

Learning from Loss: Acknowledging the inevitable nature of losses in both wrestling and life, the speech urged the importance of gaining perspective from setbacks and using them as opportunities for growth.
Taking Responsibility: Wrestling's public nature was lauded for forcing individuals to take responsibility for their losses. The speech emphasized the choice to either blame external factors, quit, or take responsibility and work towards improvement.

Learning to Win with Humility: The wrestlers were praised for their role in revitalizing the team and reminded of the transient nature of success. The importance of remaining humble and gracious, both in wrestling and life, was emphasized.
Staying Calm Under Pressure: Drawing parallels between wrestling situations and real-life challenges, the speech highlighted the wrestlers' ability to stay calm under pressure and encouraged them to carry this skill into future endeavors.

Shaking Hands: The significance of shaking hands after every match, regardless of the outcome, was emphasized as a symbol of sportsmanship and an important lesson in fostering understanding and potential friendships.
Coach Smith concluded by urging the wrestlers to savor their last moments on the wrestling mat, expressing gratitude for the experiences and lessons gained over the four years of high school wrestling. The wrestlers were encouraged to give thanks for the sport and to cherish the memories, emotions, and camaraderie associated with it.

The budget will be available for review on May 7, 2024, at the District Clerk's Office in the Junior-Senior High School.
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the annual meeting of the qualified voters of the Franklinville Central School District of the Town of Franklinville, Cattaraugus County, New York, will be held at the Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School in said District on Tuesday, May 21, 2024, at 12:00 PM prevailing time, at which said vote and election will be held for eight consecutive hours between the hours of 12:00 PM and 8:00 PM, prevailing time, in the Gymnasium Foyer at Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School. At that time, the polls will be opened to vote by voting by ballot or machine upon the following items:
To adopt the School District's annual budget for the fiscal year 2024-2025 and to authorize the appropriate, the requisite portion thereof to be raised by taxation on the District's taxable property.
To elect one (1) member of the Board for a fiveyear term commencing July 1,2024 , expiring on June 30, 2029, and to succeed Scott Hillman, whose term expires on June 30, 2024.

The District Clerk must receive absentee ballots no later than 5:00 PM, prevailing time, on Tuesday, May 21, 2024. A list of persons to whom absentee ballots are issued will be available for inspection to qualified voters of the District in the office of the District Clerk on and after May 14, 2024, between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM on weekdays before the day set for the annual election and on May 21, 2024, the day set for the election, and said list will be posted at the polling place at the election. Any qualified voter present in the polling place may object to the voting of the ballot upon appropriate grounds for making their challenge, and the reasons are therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.
AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that Military voters who are qualified school district voters may apply for a military ballot. Eligible military voters may designate their preference for receiving their application: by mail, facsimile transmission or electronic mail. If no designation is indicated, the military ballot application will be transmitted by mail. A list of all persons to whom military voter ballots shall have been issued will be available for inspection in the Office of the School District Clerk on each of the five (5) days prior to the day of the election (except Saturday and Sunday), and such list shall also be posted at the voting place during the election, and any qualified voter may challenge the acceptance of the military voter's ballot of any person on such list, by making his challenge and the reasons therefor known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls.

## AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

 that applications for an early mail ballot may be applied for at the Office of the School District Clerk. Applications for early mail ballots may be accepted beginning April 22, 2024 through May 15, 2024, to receive the ballot by regular mail and no later than May 20, 2024 to have the ballot delivered in person. A list of all persons towhom early mail ballots shall have been issued will be available for inspection in the Office of the School District Clerk on each of the five (5) days prior to the day of the election (except Saturday and Sunday), and such list shall also be posted at the voting place during the election, and any qualified voter may challenge the acceptance of the early mail voter's ballot of any person on such list, by making his challenge and the reasons therefor known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls;

## AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

 that the qualified voters of the School District are entitled to vote at said annual vote and election. A qualified voter is (1) a citizen of the United States of America, (2) eighteen years (18) of age or older, and (3) a resident within the School District for thirty (30) days preceding the annual vote and election. The School district may require all persons offering to vote at the budget vote and election to provide one form of proof of residency under Education Law $\$ 2018$-c. Such form may include a driver's license, a non-driver identification card, a utility bill, or a voter registration card. Upon offer of proof of residency, the School District may also require all persons offering to vote to provide their signature, printed name, and address. Any person who would not be qualified to register or vote under the provisions of Election Law Sections 5-100 and 5-106 will not have the right to register for or vote in an election.AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that pursuant to a rule adopted under Education by $\$ 2035$ and 2008 of the Education Law, any referenda or propositions to amend the budget, otherwise to be submitted for voting at said election, must be filed with the Franklinville Central School District Board of Education at the Regular Meeting on or before April 16, 2024, at 5:00 PM prevailing time; must be typed or printed in English, must be directed to the Clerk of the School District and signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the District; and must state the name and residence of each signer. However, the School board will not entertain any petition to place before the voters any proposition the purpose of which is not within the powers of the voters to determine, or any proposition which fails to include a specific appropriation where the proposition requires the expenditure of monies.
